Context

Our overarching strategy combines the school engagement strategies of six boroughs in the South East London Music Education Hub: Lambeth, Lewisham, Southwark, Bexley, Greenwich, and Bromley. It integrates their unique approaches, strengths, and shared goals to provide a collective vision to strengthen engagement with schools across the consortium. The strategy aligns with the National Plan for Music Education 2022. By leveraging the expertise and resources of our six partner services, the hub offers a cohesive approach to support statefunded, special, and alternative provision schools in providing exceptional music education.

A unified approach to school engagement in the South East London Music Hub underpins the school engagement strategy

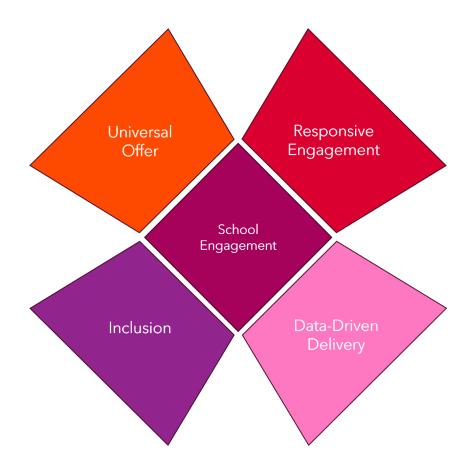

At the heart of school engagement strategy is a belief in sustained, two-way dialogue with schools. We recognise that every school is different, with its own context, strengths, challenges and priorities. Our model of engagement is therefore both strategic and responsive. We will build lasting partnerships through a combination of ongoing conversations, targeted support, co-designed CPD, and shared projects. This includes developing formal partnerships with Lead Schools.

We will maintain a universal offer that is accessible to every school, regardless of size, setting or stage of engagement. This includes curriculum resources, specialist tuition opportunities, access to instruments, and performance projects. We will also offer tailored support for schools to develop or refresh their SMDPs, with templates, workshops and 1:1 advisory visits to help schools reflect on their provision and set clear goals for improvement.

Objectives

The overarching objective is to ensure that every school in South East London has equitable access to high-quality curriculum and co-curricular music education through a universal yet responsive offer, tailored to individual contexts and needs, with a strong focus on inclusion and continuous improvement driven by data and feedback.

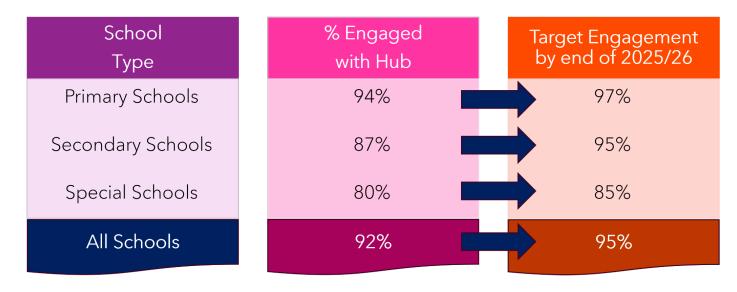


Benchmarking

Our approach is grounded in a detailed understanding of the school landscape in South East London. As of Spring 2024, based on benchmarking completed across the 6 South East London areas, 92% of schools in the region have engaged with the Hub's offer. Engagement has been stronger within the primary sector (94%) and lower among secondary schools (87%) and special schools and alternative provision settings (80%), highlighting a need to increase strategic conversations to reach all schools within the region.

We have used these figures to establish realistic yet ambitious targets for growth. Our goal is to increase engagement among primary schools to 97%, secondary schools to 95%, and special/AP settings to 85% by July 2026. To support this ambition, we will monitor engagement quarterly, using a centralised dashboard to track reach, uptake of services, and development of School Music Development Plans (SMDPs).

We are also carefully monitoring cross-border engagement, where Multi-Academy Trusts may have a particular relationship with one of the SELMH partners and/or delivery partners such as ArtsTrain (NPO) who work across Bexley, Bromley and Lewisham.



Aims, Actions and Measures

The table below sets out the core aims of the South East London Music Hub's School Engagement Strategy; alongside the key actions we will take to achieve them and the outcome measures that will be used to track progress. These aims are informed by robust data. The outcomes will be monitored regularly through school feedback, participation data, and reporting to the Principal Partners and Advisory Group.

These activities align with the National Plan for Music Education (NPME) 2022, particularly with the following aims and strategic functions:

Access

Ensuring that all children and young people, regardless of their background, can progress through equitable access to high-quality music education.

Sustainability

Establishing robust data-driven mechanisms to measure and improve the effectiveness of provision.

Partnerships

Utilising data to foster collaboration between schools, local authorities, and external partners.

Monitoring and Review

This School Engagement Strategy was recommended to both the Board of Directors (27.02.25) and Advisory Group (19.03.25) as part of the LPME.

Following recommendations from the SELMH Relationship Development Manager this strategy was updated on Thursday 20th March 2025.

This strategy will be reviewed at board and advisory group meetings in September 2025.
